Donna MacPherson, Joy Elder and Gayle Christopher represented our club at the annual GA District Spring Conference. Thank you ladies.





Do Nothing Cake Submitted by Mildred Bell

2 cups all-purpose flour
2 eggs, slightly beaten
20 oz. can crushed pineapple, undrained
2 cups sugar
1 tsp. vanilla
1 tsp. baking soda


Combine all ingredients and mix by hand. Pour into a greased 9x13 inch pan and bake at 350° F. for 30-35 minutes. Spread topping on cake while warm.

Topping
5 oz. evaporated milk
½ cup butter or margarine
1 cup sugar
1 ½ cups coconut
1 cup pecans, chopped

Mix milk, sugar and butter in a saucepan. Boil 5 minutes. Add coconut and pecans. Spread on warm cake.
